
Local Revenue Measure Results March 2024

NOTE: Final certified results will not be available for several weeks once all the votes have been tabulated and reported by elections officials. The results are likely to change for some measures.

There were over 130 local measures on the March 5, 2024 election in California. Among these were 86 measures affecting local taxes, fees or charges.

Among the 86 measures were 51 school measures including 40 school bond measures seeking a total of \$3.9 billion in school construction bond financing. There were 35 city, county and special district fiscal measures including 18 majority vote measures and 17 special taxes and bond measures requiring two-thirds voter approval. Among these were 17 add-on sales tax measures and 11 parcel taxes.



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
Preliminary Election Results

Based on election night tallies with more than half of votes cast still to be counted, 56 of the 86 tax or bond measures passed. This 65 percent passing rate is below primary elections over the past 20 years with the exception of the record setting primary election in 2020, also held in March rather than June.




California Local Tax & Bond Measures March 2024



School Measures: Bonds and Parcel Taxes

School bonds are used for capital facilities and involve a borrowing that is paid back over time with an increase in the *ad valorem* property tax rate. The passage rate this election for school bonds is right at prior elections although the number of measures is lower.

Parcel taxes are non-ad valorem (rate per parcel) taxes. Proceeds from parcel taxes may be used to pay for operations. All of the school parcel taxes passed, except one. Notably, that was the only one that was a new tax – not an extension. It was also the only one qualified by initiative and so, pursuant to recent court decisions, needed just majority voter approval.



School Parcel Taxes ✓

Parcel taxes are non ad-valorem taxes on property (rate per parcel). Proceeds from parcel taxes may be used to pay for operations.

In this election, there were seven measures that were extensions of previously approved taxes. All were placed on the ballot by their school district boards and required two-thirds voter approval. All seven passed.

School Bonds ✓

There were 40 local school bonds on the ballot this election, all requiring 55 percent approval. Just 22 appear to have passed, approving a total of \$2.946 billion in bond financing for new school facilities.

Local Add-On Sales Taxes (Transaction and Use Taxes) ✓

Voters in eight cities and one county unincorporated area considered general purpose majority vote add-on sales tax rates ranging from 1/2 percent to one percent. All appear to have passed but two are very close.

Pomona voters considered dueling measures regarding the extension of their previously approved ¾ cent add-on transactions tax. Measure P would extend the tax without sunset. Measure X would reduce the tax to ½ cent. Both passed, but Measure P prevailed with more "yes" votes.

Five add-on sales tax measures were placed on the ballot by citizens' initiative. Under recent court rulings, the Proposition 218 state constitutional requirement for a two-thirds vote for a special tax does not apply to a measure placed on the ballot by citizens' initiative. Nevertheless, the measures in Amador City and Merced achieved more then two-thirds approval.

The sales tax for the California state university in Fresno County was defeated. This would have been an unprecedented use of local sales taxes for a state program.

Vehicle Registration Taxes ✓

Two counties submitted measures to continue existing local vehicle registration taxes used for abandoned vehicle abatement. Since Proposition 26 of 2010, these are now legally taxes - not fees - and require two-thirds voter approval. Mendocino's measure R passed but Calaveras' measure B failed with 64% "yes" vote.

The City of Santa Clara remains the only city in California to elect it's police chief. Voters in Lassen County turned back a proposal to improve the professionalism of important county financial functions by consolidating the Auditor, Controller, Tax Collector and Treasurer office and making that office appointed, rather than elected.
